

Year 6

Are you listening boy? What is 27 plus 45? Come on – faster now; we haven't got all day! Find out about super-strict schools by travelling back in time to a Victorian classroom. Make sure you're on your best behaviour though, as punishments were unquestionably terrible!

Maths: The children will be learning about ordering, adding and subtracting fractions as well as fractions and their decimal equivalents.

Then, they will also learn about simple formulae and link this with algebraic problems.

We will also cover statistics, shape and multiplication methods.

Art & Design: We will focus on developing our observational drawing and printing skills linked with William Morris. The children will also learn a variety of stitches in order to make a traditional Victorian sampler.

Physical development: Gymnastics is the main focus of this topic but invasion games will be included too. In gymnastics, we will perfect and perform a range of balances which will be evaluated by the children. PE lessons will take place on a Friday for all Y6 pupils.



English: We will be developing our understanding and ability to write non-chronological reports about Victorian schools. We will also developing our skills around diary writing and biographies. We will further develop our understanding of SPAG and ability to apply it in everyday writing tasks.

History: The historical focus during this topic will be the Victorians with an emphasis on learning about Queen Victoria and her life, Victorian schools, slums and crime and punishment.

Computing: This term computing will focus on developing word processing and PowerPoint presentation skills which will be linked with our science and history work.

Music: In music, we will be improvising and composing music based on Victorian parlour songs using recorders. We will also be humming, singing along to popular Victorian tunes.

Homework: The children are expected to complete their homework every week. Homework is given out on a Thursday and is expected in by the following Tuesday at the latest. Children should read every day and have their reading diary signed at least once per week. Maths, English and spelling tasks will be given as homework.
